OPEN SESSION

Agenda Item 1 – Call the meeting to Order / Roll Call / Pledge of Allegiance/
Establishment of Quorum

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 am.

Agenda Item 2 –Welcome –Chairman’s opening remarks

Chairman Carvelli welcomed everyone to the meeting and mentioned a few the milestones that the Commission has achieved recently. He explained that there has been a significant increase in regulated events in California, many efforts being made with regard to tribal relations, and the implementation of the C3 Logix Program. He also acknowledged the Commission’s efforts in generating an appropriate method for spending neurological fund money.

Agenda Item 3 – Approval of the October 18, 2016, Commission Meeting Minutes

EO Foster presented the Commission with the minutes of the October 18, 2016, Commission Meeting for approval. Commissioner Shen-Urquidez requested revisions to Agenda Item 4.

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez motioned to approve the Commission Meeting minutes, as amended.

Vice Chair Lehman seconded the motion.

The motion passed 5-0 by roll call vote.

Agenda Item 4 – Recognition of The Ultimate Fighting Championships for providing greater opportunities for CSAC licensees to participate in major professional Mixed Martial Arts contests

Chairman Carvelli presented a special commendation to the Ultimate Fighting Championship (UFC), a world renowned Mixed Martial Arts (MMA) promoter licensed by the California State Athletic Commission (Commission), promotes many high profile MMA champions and contenders. Their events have allowed greater opportunities for California licensees to participate in major professional MMA contests in California.

Mr. Reed Harris, Vice President of Athlete Development for the UFC, accepted the commendation on behalf of UFC and expressed his gratitude to the Commission and the Legislature for their role in growing the sport of MMA in California.

Joseph Benavidez, UFC Champion, also thanked the Commission for their acknowledgment and support with training and competing in the State.

Agenda Item 5 – Executive Officer's Report

Budget Update for the Support Fund, the Neurological Fund, and Pension program with DCA Budget Staff assistance for explanations regarding Pro Rata/Distributed Costs and other budget items

EO Foster introduced Mr. Mark Ito, DCA Budget Analyst and Mr. Taylor Schick, DCA Fiscal Officer, to speak on behalf of the Commission's Pro Rata expenses.

He further explained that the Commission's current revenue to the support fund for through Fiscal Month (FM) 5 of Fiscal Year (FY) 16-17 is \$556,961. The current expenditures to the support fund through FM5 are \$598,760. While expenditures currently exceed revenue by \$41,799, he anticipates several strong revenue months going into 2017. The current fund balance for the Athletic Commission support fund is \$1,004,131.

Mr. Ito reviewed the current budget standing of the Commission. Mr. Schick addressed the Commission's concerns regarding the formula that the Department of Consumer Affairs uses to calculate State Pro Rata charges.

Report on Pending and Proposed Regulations and Legislation

AEO Sophia Cornejo provided a summary of the pending regulations.

- Payment to Contestants
 - a. The Rulemaking file was published by OAL on 8/12/2016 and a public hearing was held on 9/26/2016. The final package was submitted to DCA for approval on 10/31/2016.
- Examination of Boxer Applicants and Neurological Assessment
 - a. The Rulemaking file was published by OAL on 8/12/2016 and a public hearing was held on 9/26/2016. The final package was submitted to DCA for approval on 11/16/2016.
- Headgear – EMERGENCY Regulation
 - a. The Rulemaking file was published by OAL on 7/29/2016 and a public hearing was held on 9/12/2016. The Final Rulemaking File was submitted to DCA and Agency for approval on 10/7/2016.
- Weighing Time, Time for Physical Examinations, and Dehydration and Rehydration – EMERGENCY Regulation
 - a. The Rulemaking file was published by OAL on 7/29/2016 and a public hearing was held on 9/12/2016. The final package was submitted to DCA for approval on 10/31/2016.

Status Update of Delegated Entities

California Amateur Mixed Martial Arts Organization (CAMO)

Mr. JT Steele, CAMO President, explained that it is currently a slow time for events right now and that they are utilizing this time cleanup. He also mentioned that the amateur promoters who have been doing well have expressed interest in shifting to the professional level. He stated that as of the last meeting, there has been no significant safety issues to report on.

EO Foster stated that officials participating in Pro-Am shows allow synergy of officials to develop and leads to better officiating in all events.

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez inquired whether the Commission intends to implement the C3 Logix neurologic testing on the amateur side. EO Foster replied that the hope is to hold a stakeholder meeting to discuss the possibility. Mr. Steele mentioned that CAMO would be interested in utilizing the C3 Logix program.

Vice Chair Lehman commended Mr. Steele on the work that CAMO does to provide regulation to amateur MMA and acknowledged a concern he had in his report.

Mr. Steele elaborated that the Commission has recently hired many new inspectors and he would request that they be further trained on the amateur process as they are occasionally utilized in place of CAMO inspectors to cut costs on Pro-Am shows.

USA Boxing

EO Foster announced to the Commission that Mr. Martino, President of ABC Boxing is resigning. He acknowledged that he has enjoyed working with Mr. Martino and that he will be meeting and working with the new director soon. EO Foster presented the report from USA boxing to the Commissioners.

International Kickboxing Federation (IKF)

The Commission heard the report from Mr. Fossum during the associated agenda item later in the meeting.

United State Fight League (USFL)

Mr. Jon Frank presented the Commission with a Power Mr. Charlie Wong, Agency for Student Health Research, presented a report on Compete Safe. Point presentation on USFL's plan to comply with AB2007 regarding concussion protocol.

Chairman Carvelli directed all delegated entities to report to EO Foster as soon as they have been contacted for media.

Update on CSAC Sports Concussion Management Protocol

EO Foster reported on the status of the purchase of the C3 Logix system. He explained that the C3 Logix system training was given on November 29, 2016, in Los Angeles to many Southern and Central Athletic Inspectors and the Northern California Athletic Inspectors and Office Staff on December 12, 2016. He reported that implementation of the C3 system with C3 Staff assistance began with many mixed martial arts athletes as they arrived for the December 17, 2016, UFC check-ins in Sacramento, and then again later in the week for the boxers competing on the Hopkins vs. Smith fight promoted by Golden Boy in Los Angeles.

Upcoming Event Schedule

EO Foster reported on this during the associated agenda item later in the meeting.

Update on CSAC Education Video and Brochures

Report on recommendations at the December 10, 2016, Medical Advisory Committee Meeting

EO Foster explained the primary goal of the Medical Advisory Committee's recommendation is to baseline 300 athletes in 2017. He stated that he believes that the Commission will be able to do more and that as of the meeting date, the Commission has already successfully completed 35 exams. However, this relies almost exclusively on the funding available through the next few months. He further explained that the recommendations prioritize the candidates for testing by high risk, pro-debut, and athletes above 40 years of age and over.

Report on Regulation of Combat Sports in California with Executive Summary

As suggested by Commissioner Sauter at the last Commission meeting of 2015, Staff began tracking critical information so the Commission could gauge, year over year, how we were doing in various areas regarding combat sports in California. EO Foster explained that he found that request and suggestion incredibly useful and has directed Staff to create and

update a master log to track critical data. The 2016 Executive Summary booklet was created based on this tracked information and made available to the Commissioners.

Agenda Item 6 – Subcommittee Updates

Pension Fund Subcommittee (Commissioner Lehman and Ayala)

EO Foster summarized the Pension Fund's balance, and further explained that on average over the past 5 years, the Commission has deposited approximately \$80,000 per year; however, the Commission has paid out an average of \$280,000 to eligible boxers.

EO Foster invited Ms. Beth Harrington, Benefit Resources, to come forward and provide the Commissioners with her presentation regarding 2016 finances. Ms. Harrington gave an overview and described the charts she provided to the Commissioners in the meeting materials.

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez asked as we pay out more each year, how do we compare our fund to how it is performing on the allocation side. Ms. Harrington stated that we allocate based on rounds and purses for each athlete. She doesn't know of any other pension plan like ours.

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez asked the EO Foster if Pension information is provided to licensees. EO Foster responded that yes, many efforts are made in outreach to boxers regarding their eligibility for pension in the State of California. Commissioner Shen-Urquidez further stated that the brochure may not be enough and it should contain details how the plan works.

Chairman Carvelli stated that this was a great presentation and thanked Ms. Harrington for her detailed reports.

Report from Cyril Shah of Raymond James Financial Services regarding the status of the Pension Fund investment account and allocation of assets.

Mr. Cyril Shah, Raymond James Financial, provided a presentation to the Commissioners regarding the investment side of the Pension Funds. Mr. Shah referred to his reports that he provided the Commissioners in the meeting materials. He went into detail and explained why the allocations are at the percentages that they are at.

Agenda Item 7 – Discussion, review and possible action regarding the delegation of amateur kickboxing to the International Kickboxing Federation (IKF).

EO Foster provided the Commission with a summary of Mr. Steve Fossum's performance with the delegation and regulation of amateur kickboxing and recommended that the Commission approve a full delegation equivalent to the other delegated entities.

Mr. Fossum reported on the status of the amateur kickboxing delegation with IKF. He explained that this delegation has allowed many athletes to begin their kickboxing experience in the amateur program, which allows them to experiment with the sport on a trial basis.

Vice Chair Lehman motioned to extend IKF's delegation on the same terms of other amateur delegations and to revisit in one year.

Mr. Gary Duke, Legal Counsel, explained that he has redrafted the formal delegation letter to be consistent with the CAMO delegation letter.

Vice Chair Lehman revised her motion to extend IKF's delegation on the same terms of other amateur delegations and that EO Foster, Mr. Fossum and Mr. Duke will revised the written delegation letter for Chairman Carvelli's signature.

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez *seconded the motion.*

Motion passed 5-0 by roll call vote.

Agenda Item 8 – Discussion and possible action regarding the adoption of the revised Unified Rules of Mixed Martial Arts as adopted by the Association of Boxing Commissions at their annual meeting in Las Vegas in August 2016

EO Foster stated that the Association of Boxing Commissions (ABC) voted to change the Unified Rules of MMA at the 2016 annual meeting. EO Foster stated that he is the head of the ABC Medical Committee and the Committee voted unanimously to change the unified rules. EO Foster asked Referee John McCarthy and Mike Beltran to summarize the changes to the Commissioners. Mr. McCarthy went through some of the major rules that were removed, added or modified and some of the rationale behind the changes.

Chairman Carvelli asked if anyone had any questions for Mr. McCarthy regarding any of the rule changes. Vice Chair Lehman asked who was the opposing vote and Mr. McCarthy responded that it was New Jersey State Athletic Commission.

Commissioner Sauter asked whether the rule changes have the potential of inhibiting EO Foster or the Commission. Mr. McCarthy responded that the problem is that all the states have different rules for MMA and that the more the States that are on board with uniform rules, the better the sport will be for the athletes and the officials.

EO Foster also commented that MMA promoters, UFC and Bellator, are in full support of these changes and both of these organizations have written letters of support, and those letters are in the Commissioners meeting materials. EO Foster read aloud Rule 533 to the Commission.

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez motioned to authorize and approve the revised Unified Rules of Mixed Martial Arts adopted by the ABC.

Commissioner Williams seconded the motion.

Motion passed 5-0 by roll call vote.

Agenda Item 9 – Review and approval of proposed regulations to amend sections 201.5, 206, 260, and 294 of Division 2, of Title 4 of the California Code of Regulations regarding Technical Zones (The area located between the ring and the Commission approved barrier)

EO Foster referenced that the October 18, 2016, a proposal was presented to consider modifications to the Commission's current regulations regarding Technical Zones (the area located between the ring and the Commission approved barrier) and that the Commission should have full control over how the Technical Zone is set up and used. EO Foster further explained that he was directed to and has completed drafting

language to define the Technical Zone as well as outline the responsibilities and authority of the Commission and the Promoter.

Commissioner Shen-Urquidez inquired on this regulation package able to be processed on an emergency basis. Mr. Duke responded that it would require significant justification, but that he believes it will be achievable.

After much discussion, Commissioner Shen-Urquidez motioned to approve the language text as amended and under the emergency regulation process.

Commissioner Sauter seconded the motion.

Motion passed 5-0 by roll call vote.

Agenda Item 10 – Review and approval of 2017 CSAC Meeting calendar.

EO Foster highlighted the following events:

A. Budget Update for the Support Fund (including DCA and State Pro Rata), the Neurological Fund, and Pension program and update on FY 17-18 CSAC budget.

The Commission's budget update through Fiscal Month 7 (January) is \$934,623 in revenue and \$852,594 in expenditures. The current fund balance (reserve fund) for economic uncertainties is \$1,127,960. (Please see attachments)

The Commission has increased expenses in several line items that have not appeared yet. Inspector costs associated with C3 Logix testing and out of competition drug testing should appear next month. Additionally, costs for drug testing with UCLA Olympic Analytical Laboratory and Request a Test should be paid and appear on the next budget report. Even with these expenses outstanding, I am optimistic that the Commission's budget is on track for Fiscal Year (FY) 16-17.

The Governor's budget for FY 17-18 has been released and of note the pro rata charges paid to the DCA and to the state have increased again for FY 17-18. This increase prompted Chairman Carvelli to request information from me in a letter that I provided to him (please see attached). With this information, he directed me to schedule a call with Taylor Schick of the DCA budget office and Mr. Schick gave an explanation as to why the Commission's pro rata increased. Chairman Carvelli and I both participated in the call and I learned a lot regarding the process. Taylor has assured us that we will have more input next budget cycle regarding how the DCA pro rata is calculated.

Statewide pro rata has been backed out of the FY16-17 and FY 17-18 budget, but the statewide pro rata will still be assessed, it will just come directly out of the Commission's fund and not an individual budget item.

The Department of Finance has approved the Commission's Budget Change Proposal that allows the Commission to request additional funding for inspectors and travel costs associated with regulating the events. The Legislature still must approve this change and

I have a hearing scheduled with the Assembly Sub 4 budget committee on March 28th regarding this proposal.

B. Report on Pending and Proposed Regulations

1. Payment of Contestants – No updates since the last meeting. The Rulemaking file was published by OAL on 8/12/16 and a public hearing was held on 9/26/16. The final package was submitted to Legal Counsel for review and approval on 10/31/16.
2. Examination of Boxer Applicants and Neurological Assessment – This is a separate item on today's agenda.
3. Headgear –The Final Rulemaking File was approved by DCA and Agency on 1/26/17 and submitted to OAL for final review and approval on 2/10/17.
4. Weighing Time, Time for Physical Examinations, and Dehydration and Rehydration - The Rulemaking file was published by OAL on 7/29/16 and a public hearing was held on 9/12/16. The final package was submitted to DCA for approval on 10/31/16.
5. Technical Zone – After the last changes that were made to the proposed language by the Commission and further discussion with Legal Counsel, it was determined that this regulation proposal would duplicate existing regulations. On March 3, 2017, a memorandum was sent to all Ringside Physicians and Lead Athletic Inspectors giving direction and clarification of California Code of Regulations section 294, Emergency Equipment Required.

D. Update on C3 Logix Sports Concussion Management Program

On December 10, 2016, the Advisory Committee on Medical and Safety Standards (Medical Advisory Committee or MAC) established objectives for implementing the C3 Logix Sports Concussion Management Program (Program). The MAC's target for the Program's first year is to complete baseline testing on 300 licensed athletes where priority is given to those who are considered high risk on the Boxing Severity Index, athletes making their pro-debut, and athletes 40 years of age and over.

Accordingly, Commission staff has organized efforts to meet these goals. As of March 1, 2017, the beginning of the Program's third month, the Commission has completed 159 baseline tests on athletes.

Dear Chairman Carvelli,

This letter is in response to your questions regarding the Commission's budget related to Department of Consumer Affairs (DCA) and State Pro Rata and our current staffing levels. There have been significant increases in what the Commission is charged for the DCA Pro Rata and the State Pro Rata. The amount the Commission is charged for Pro Rata has increase 135% in 4 years, while the overall budget has increased 22.1% (this represents the additional 100K that will be taken from the CSAC fund that has been removed as a line item in the budget, but must be paid). The following chart illustrates the changes in Pro Rata over 4 fiscal years and the Pro Rata percentage of the Commissions total budget:

*The State Pro Rata has been removed as a budget line item, but still must be paid. I was informed that it will be directly taken out of the Commission's fund.

Also, in response to your question regarding the Commission's staffing levels; the current staffing levels are much lower than they were prior to FY 2012/13. Due to the increase in workload in the office, I was planning to fill a vacant office technician position; however, I have reservations that the Commission cannot afford the additional costs long term considering the significant increases in the DCA and State Pro Rata. These increases are fiscally unsustainable and I am concerned we may begin a trend where expenses exceed revenue which will decrease the fund balance. Due to increased workload from an increase

in events, I plan to move forward with the recruitment process to fill the vacancy even though we face these substantial increases.

The following chart illustrates the staffing levels of the Commission office for the past three years:

Re: CAMO UPDATE / DOCUMENT REQUEST

Below please find a CAMO update and report in anticipation of the CSAC meeting scheduled for March 14, 2017 in Los Angeles, CA:

1. CAMO SAFETY AND SUSPENSION REPORT:

There have been no injuries of a heightened concern for the commission to review since the last CSAC meeting and report December 16, 2016.

2. FINANCIAL REPORT:

CAMO prepared and submitted a full financial report ("Full Report") in anticipation of the October 18, 2016 meeting. Since that meeting, CAMO has successfully endured the seasonal slowdown period, as anticipated. March appears to be a very busy month for CAMO seeing several new promoters and venues. Most importantly, we have seen a sharp increase in the number of amateur athletes making their amateur debut in CAMO.

3. STATE CHAMPIONSHIP:

In 2016, CAMO made a dramatic change to the California State Championship Tournament changing the championship structure from an annual tournament to a linear belt system. Now, a California State Champion belt, in each weight class, is in constant circulation creating more championship fights and more opportunities for amateur athletes to become official State Champions. In the past six months, the demand for these California Title fights has significantly increased and more amateur promoters can promote championship bouts. Due to the positive response from the community CAMO anticipates that this format will be used for the foreseeable future.

4. WWW.CAMO-MMA.ORG v4.0:

CAMO is approaching the launch of a new version of the CAMO website that includes many new features that will improve stakeholder service and make it easier for athletes to complete the license process and for promoters and fighters to connect. CAMO is dedicated to leveraging technology to increase fighter safety and participation whenever possible. Some of the notable features are the improved profiles of current State Champions and integrated fighter rankings. The website also will have an improved user interface that is more modern and user friendly.

5. EVENT SHADOWING:

CAMO inspectors and ringside officials like to assist CSAC whenever possible and shadow professional CSAC events. Working together with CSAC engenders mutual trust and respect and prepares amateur officials for their professional careers. To streamline this process, CAMO is committed to establish a formal protocol for officials under the direction of Executive Officer Andy Foster that helps to build quality officials in a predictable and managed system.

6. AB 2007 COMPLIANCE:

CAMO is not a youth athletic program and does not fall under AB 2007. Nevertheless, CAMO has instituted mandatory concussion training with our officials. The Heads Up program is being used to be consistent with other organizations and has been received well and adopted into our licensing process.

In closing, we look forward to a great 2017 season. We renew our resolve to collaborate with CSAC and Executive Officer Andy Foster to explore solutions to maximize fighter safety. Thank you for your continued support.

Dear Mr. Foster,

With the retirement of Mike Martino, I have been named USA Boxing Interim Executive Director. I look forward to working with you and the Commission during this exciting time as the USA works to have Los Angeles named the host city for the 2024 Olympic Games. We are all confident that LA can provide the best Olympic experience and anticipate it being named as host city when the selection is announced in September.

I would like to thank the Commission for its continued confidence in USA Boxing as the delegated authority to conduct amateur boxing in the State of California. I am committed to continuing in my predecessor's footsteps by maintaining an excellent relationship with the Commission and am readily available for questions or consultation most any time.

In the first two months of 2017, the collective membership in California totals 2,428 (1,613 boxers and 815 coaches, officials and doctors). A detailed report broken down by LBC is enclosed. 178 club programs held 18 events, contesting more than 350 bouts with no injuries sustained and ambulances were on site for all of these events.

USA Boxing member boxers are required to have a sports physical prior to registration with USA Boxing as well as pre and post bout physicals at every competition. Coaches and Officials must complete the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) "Heads Up" concussion training. We have noted that the State of California is at the forefront for requiring concussion training for coaches and parents of youth in sports.

Sanctioned events within California are constantly updated and posted on the USA Boxing website (www.usaboxing.org) and the MatchTracker system which records athlete bout records is online and available to all Commission members. - b. All but one coach completed requirements for Feb 4th event. Subject coach did not complete CDC Concussion training or criminal background check. Coach was not allowed inside the cage and the USFL provided a substitute coach who volunteered to help his athlete.
- c. Feb 4th event had zero injuries to report and no medical / concussion suspensions.

III. Request for modification of fee schedule:

- a. Current USFL Fee schedule as follows:
\$50 – annual fighters license
\$20 – annual coaches license (plus \$18.50 for biennial background)
Free – Officials license (plus \$18.50 for biennial background)

Free – Promoters/ Matchmaker license (plus \$18.50 for biennial background)

b. Proposed modification to charge a \$20 late fee for athletes / coaches who register for license the day of event to discourage this practice which adds logistical problems associated with AB2007 compliance. 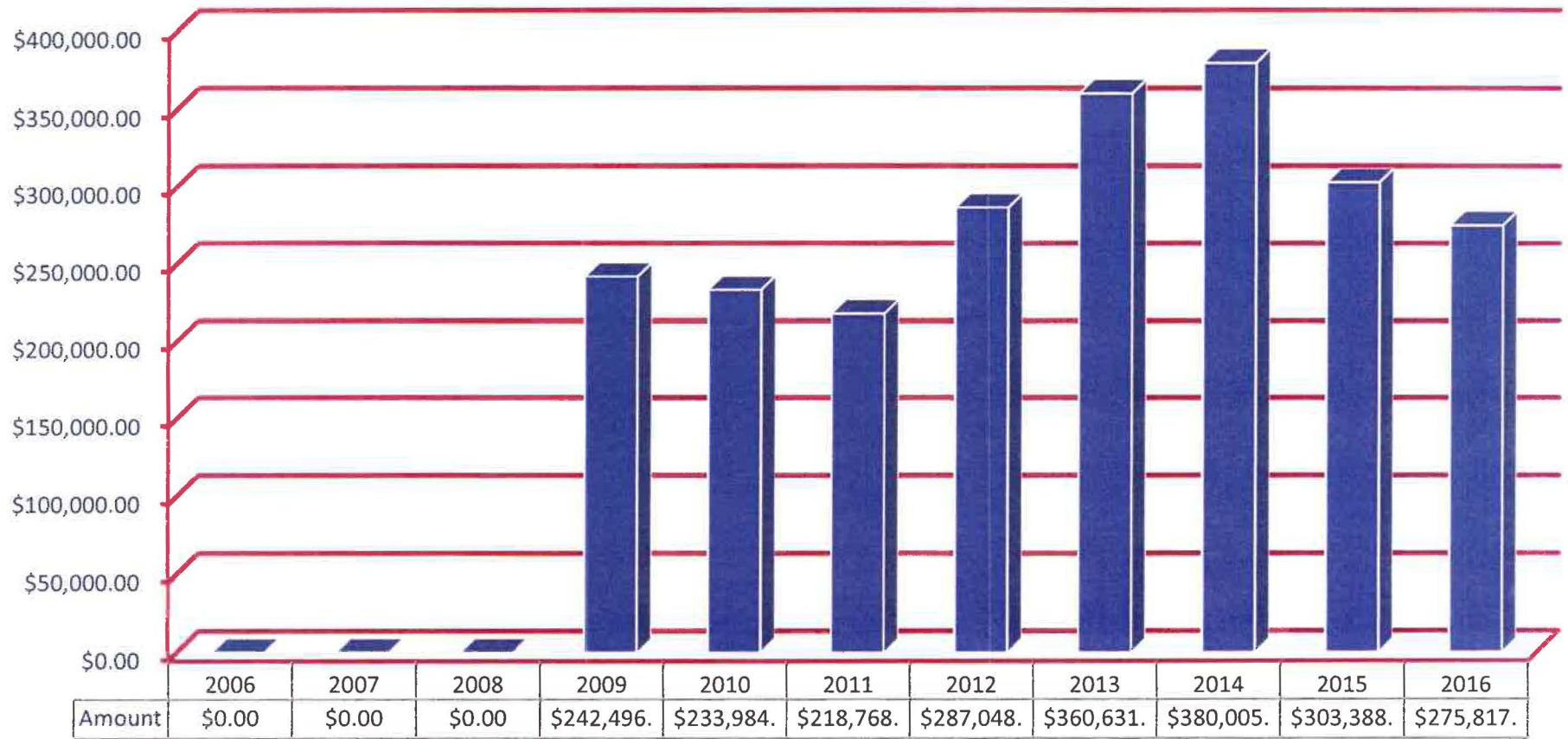
- Worked with Division of Investigations on obtaining current mailing addresses of boxers that had distributions due in 2016 and statements were mailed to all of those that we had addresses on.
- Sent the WBC a list of boxers that the Commission was unable to locate. The WBC used their office in Mexico to try to assist us with reaching out to potential claimants.
- Issued a Press Release through the Department of Consumer Affairs.

Sophia has noticed an increase in email and telephone inquiries from Boxers regarding the plan. Many of these contacts were from individuals from Mexico.

FUTURE STEPS

- I will schedule a meeting with the Division of Investigation to discuss further what services they can possibly provide the Commission with investigating further the location of potential late claimants.
- I will schedule a meeting with the DCA Budget Office regarding redirecting the Division of Investigations costs over to the Pension Fund rather than the Support Fund.
- Follow-up with the WBC regarding their assistance with reaching out to boxers in Mexico.

SUBJECT	Agenda Item #8 – Discussion on the way the Commission views the “show money” and the “win bonus” in relation to the overall purse in Mixed Martial Arts Bout Contracts

Mixed Martial Arts (MMA) and Boxing athletes are contracted and paid in a different manner. Boxing athletes have historically been paid a total purse. However, most of the MMA athletes that compete in California regulated events are paid a “show purse” and a “win bonus”. We are beginning to see a trend in MMA regarding the fines associated with violating bout contract terms when athletes come in overweight.

The penalty for MMA fighters weighing in over their contracted weight has only been assessed from their “show purse” and not their “win bonus”. This has become a health and safety issue as it relates to dehydration and weight cutting. Some fighters have calculated that it behooves them to be fined the 20% of the “show purse” rather than cut large amounts of weight, resulting in being the larger athlete, and feel better during the bout. If the overweight athlete wins the bout, they still receive 100% of the win bonus and in effect are only fined 10% of their overall contract amount. Likewise, the losing athlete is not being compensated accordingly.

Furthermore, for discussion purposes, amending the bout agreement is just one of several measures that the Commission can take to address the issue of drastic weight cutting and fighting in the appropriate weight class. Through thoughtful regulatory action, the goal is for matchmakers and fighters to contract to the appropriate weight class.

In addition, I directed staff to begin revisions of the Commission’s Professional Athlete License Application to request of athletes the weight class (or the lowest weight class if more than one) they plan to compete in. Commission staff is making similar changes to the Athlete Physical which will direct the physician to certify that the weight class the athlete has requested to be licensed is an appropriate weight for the athlete to compete in based on their body composition.

Furthermore, I have also asked our doping collection partners, USADA and VADA, as well as CSAC Doping Control Officers, to provide me the feasibility of collecting weights when they administer and collect out-of-competition drug testing in the field.

We are also exploring the possibility of assigning an Athletic Inspector to check the weights of athletes while conducting neurological testing during the opening of "fight week" for the larger events. The Commission may consider proposing regulations, if sufficient authority does not currently exist, to authorize random weight checks to determine actual "walk around" weight and mandatory weight class restrictions for fighters who miss weight.

In summary, some measure that can be taken to ensure the health and safety of professional athletes can begin with the following:

- 1) Changes to bout agreement to obtain parity with boxing
- 2) Possibly increasing the financial penalty for missing weight and potentially adding a license suspension
- 3) Licensing by weight class
- 4) Requested Weight Class certified as safe and healthy by the licensing physician on the licensing physical
- 5) Random weight checks in the field for licensed athletes
- 6) Mandatory weight class restrictions for fighters who miss weight

The Commission has already taken steps to address dehydration and rehydration issues with the regulation package approved last year; however, more needs to be done. This amendment to the bout agreement to obtain parity with boxing is one of many steps towards our goal of fighters safely competing.

The above parties agree with each other and the California State Athletic Commission, hereinafter referred to as the commission, to induce its acceptance of this bout contract, as follows:

BOUT AND WEIGHT 1. Contestant shall appear and enter into a **boxing / martial arts** bout (circle one) at the stated venue for the promoter at the proposed weight on the _____ day of _____, in the year _____, or on a date to be agreed upon not later than _____ weeks from the date set forth above, for _____ rounds to a decision. Contestant weights shall be in compliance with Rule 298 (Boxing) or 510 (Martial Arts). Contract Weight means the weight that the bout is proposed for. Record only the **exact** Contract Weight. If a Contestant fails to make the Contract Weight the commission determines the course of action in accordance to regulations and or policies.

All Contestants shall be weighed in the presence of a commission representative, on scales approved by the commission and at a time and place to be set by the commission. The "ACTUAL WEIGHT" on the bout contract is the official weight. The "PROPOSED WEIGHT" on the bout contract is the weight initially agreed upon by all parties subject to commission approval. Weight loss as determined by the commission to be detrimental to the health and safety of a contestant shall not be allowed. Contestant shall report at the required time and place to be weighed and undergo a medical examination in accordance with the laws and regulations of the commission. Contestant shall also report to the promoter or designated commission representative at the time instructed by the commission. Failure to comply with these provisions shall be deemed to be a breach of this contract.

If the contestant fails to make the **contract weight**, 20% of his or her **entire compensation (including bonuses)** shall be forfeited **and will then be divided equally** between opponent and commission. The manager shall also forfeit a sum of money to the opponent equal to that which was forfeited by the contestant.

COMPENSATION 2. Promoter will pay contestant the sum of _____ Dollars (\$_____) or _____ percent (_____%) of the gross receipts of the promoter whichever is greater. **All parties agree that the amount listed above represents all remuneration in accordance with this Bout Contract, including bonus compensation. This payment is due the night of the bout and represents full payment for the contestant's performance of this contract.** The percentage shall be determined after deducting from the gross receipts any payments for taxes and any deductions agreed upon by the contestant and the promoter and approved by the commission prior to the bout that are itemized in accordance with Paragraph 3 of this contract.

DEDUCTIONS 3. Deductions shall either itemized in an addendum approved and filed with the commission or be clearly detailed in the "ADDITIONAL TERMS" section of this contract. Deductions that are not itemized either in an approved addendum or in the "ADDITIONAL TERMS" section of this contract shall not be deducted from the contestant's full payment under this bout contract. A deduction for licensed seconds shall be included either in the 'ADDITIONAL TERMS' of this contract or in an approved addendum, and the promoter shall deduct that sum from the contestant's purse and pay it directly to the named licensed second(s).

GROUND TO DENY COMPENSATION TO CONTESTANT 4. Unless ordered by the commission, contestant shall not be entitled to the compensation described in Paragraph 2 or any part thereof if the referee or the commission decides that the contestant and or manager:

- a. did not enter into the contract in good faith; or
- b. had any collusive understanding or agreement regarding the termination of the bout; or
- c. contestant did not compete in earnest; or
- d. contestant and/or manager have violated any of the laws, rules or regulations administered by the commission and or the State of California.

Promoter shall pay to the commission any compensation forfeited under the terms of this paragraph. The commission shall dispose of said compensation in accordance with Business and Professions Code Sections 18860 and 18861, including but not limited to forfeiture to the commission or payment of all or a portion thereof to contestant. All parties agree to accept and to be bound by the decision of the commission, which shall be final.

CONFLICTING BOUT AGREEMENTS 5. The promoter, manager, and contestant agree that they have not and will not enter into any other bout contract, written or oral, or contest that may conflict with this contract or any other bout contract filed with this commission or any other commission.

CONSEQUENCES IF BOUT FAILS TO OCCUR 6. If the promoter fails to perform as required by the terms of the contract or any statute, rule or policy enforced by the commission, the promoter shall pay the contestant reasonable compensation as determined by the commission. Nothing in this contract precludes the commission from taking immediate disciplinary action against any party to this contract for a violation of a statute, rule or policy enforced by the commission.

The promoter shall not be deemed to have failed to perform if either contestant does not appear for the bout or carry out their respective contract. If the contestant fails to perform as required by the terms of this contract, the contestant shall not compete in any subsequent bout until the contestant has competed for the promoter in a subsequent equivalent bout. The contestant will then be placed on administrative suspension until he or she fulfills their obligation to the promoter, or until the promoter releases the contestant from the obligation.

ADDITIONAL TERMS:

All bout contracts must be submitted to and approved by the commission prior to the bout. Disputes regarding the validity and enforceability of this bout contract shall be resolved by the commission only if all bout contracts pertaining to the bout have been submitted to and approved by the commission.

This contract is only valid if all parties are licensed at the time of signing.

SUBJECT	Agenda Item #9 – Review and Approval to withdraw proposed language to amend section 280, of Article 6, of Division 2, of Title 4 of the California Code of Regulations - "Examination of Boxer Applicants"

BACKGROUND

On August 12, 2016, the Commission submitted to the Office of Administrative Law proposed changes to section 280, of Division 2, of Title 4 of the California Code of Regulations "Examination of Boxer Applicants."

Per the Administrative Procedure Act, the Commission has 1 year to complete the rulemaking process on proposed language. The Commission completed all procedural requirements and submitted a complete rulemaking file to the Department of Consumer Affairs for review and approval on November 16, 2016. Since this time, Commission staff has recommended significant changes to the neurological assessment, section 280 (h) of the proposed language. These changes are as a result of implementation of the C3 Logix Program, as well as the change in the Commission's appropriation of the Neurological Fund.

Commission staff requires additional time to complete the factual basis/rationale of the changes; consequently, we do not anticipate this package being completed by August 2017. If the Commission decides to withdraw the package, Commission staff will have sufficient time to prepare and propose a new rulemaking file.

RECOMMENDATION

It is recommended the Commission withdraw the proposed regulation file Z-2016-0801-04, "Examination of Boxer Applicants" to allow additional time to prepare and propose a new rulemaking file.

The office received an appeal of decision from the Dragon House Event on January 7, 2017. The bout in question is Jumoke Hunter vs. Kailan Hill. Mr. Hunter is alleging that Mr. Hill tapped out in the first round about five times due to an arm-bar. If this were the case, the referee should have halted the bout immediately and Mr. Hunter be declared the winner by arm-bar submission.

After my review of the videos (both the YouTube and the cell phone video), it appears that Kailan Hill did indeed tap-out due to arm-bar submission and referee Ed Collantes did not see the tap because he was out of position due to the quick transition. While I do not fault the referee due to the quick transition and his focus on Mr. Hill's arm, I do believe Mr. Hill tapped. With referee Ed Collantes not catching the tap, Mr. Hill was able to continue in the bout and eventually win a unanimous decision.

Please find the statement from referee Ed Collates as well as referee and head ABC trainer John McCarthy on the video footage regarding this appeal.

Please also find the Unified Rules of Mixed Martial Arts, attached.

RECOMMENDATION

Based on the evidence, I do not recommend overturning the win to a loss. However, I would recommend that the Commission consider changing the result of this bout to reflect a "no decision".

In reviewing the video it appears that the fighter placed into the armbar taps his free hand as he is moving in a circular motion to his right. It is understandable that the referee may not have seen the tap as he was focusing on the elbow joint as the point of possible damage at this time. He also had taken himself down to a knee so when the fighters started to change their angle which is when the tap occurred, the referee was getting up and not in a position to see the tap which could be blocked from view by the fighters own body. We call this looking at the micro while missing what we would see in the macro. I do not know what occurred in the fight or if the fighter in applying the armbar released any of the tension on the arm due to feeling that there was a tap.

Thanks for meeting with me yesterday to discuss/review the video the Hunter vs Hill MMA fight which took place on January 7, 2017 in San Francisco, CA.

Upon receipt of the video on February 21, 2017, I carefully reviewed the fight sequence involving an arm bar and potential tap out by Kalynn Hill. In addition, I reviewed the video with John J. Janero, a BJJ black belt under Saulo Ribero (who is my BJJ instructor).

My conclusion after careful consideration is that I believe that Kalynn Hill did indeed tap out when Jumoke Hunter twisted his hips to invert. In that split second when Mr. Hunter twisted his hips to his right, Mr. Hill also stepped to the same side to relieve the pressure on his arm. During this transition, my direct site of the arm was blocked as I attempted to move to get a clear angle of the submission. As a result, I was unable to see the 4 taps by Mr. Hill clearly. I have concluded that the arm bar was effectively applied which forced Mr. Hill to tap out.

Please let me know if I can answer any other further questions.

Scoring:

The 10 point must system is defined as follows:

All bouts will be evaluated and scored by three judges. The 10-Point Must System will be the standard system of scoring a bout. Under the 10-Point Must Scoring System, 10 points must be awarded to the winner of the round and nine points or less must be awarded to the loser, except for an even round, which is scored (10-10).

**** as of 2017 Unified Rules ****

Effective Striking/Grapppling shall be considered the first priority of round assessments. Effective Aggressiveness is a 'Plan B' and should not be considered unless the judge does not see ANY advantage in the Effective Striking/Grapppling realm. Cage/Ring Control ('Plan C') should only be needed when ALL other criteria are 100% even for both competitors. This will be an extremely rare occurrence.

PRIORITIZED CRITERIA:

Effective Striking/Grapppling

"Legal blows that have immediate or cumulative impact with the potential to contribute towards the end of the match with the IMMEDIATE weighing in more heavily than the cumulative impact. Successful execution of takedowns, submission attempts, reversals and the achievement of advantageous positions that produce immediate or cumulative impact with the potential to contribute to the end of the match, with the IMMEDIATE weighing more heavily than the cumulative impact." It shall be noted that a successful takedown is not merely a changing of position, but the establishment of an attack from the use of the takedown. Top and bottom position fighters are assessed more on the impactful/effective result of their actions, more so than their position. This criterion will be the deciding factor in a high majority of decisions when scoring a round. The next two criteria must be treated as a backup and used ONLY when Effective Striking/Grapppling is 100% equal for the round.

Effective Aggressiveness

“Aggressively making attempts to finish the fight. The key term is ‘effective’. Chasing after an opponent with no effective result or impact should not render in the judges’ assessments.” Effective Aggressiveness is only to be assessed if Effective Striking/Grappling is 100% equal for both competitors.

Fighting Area Control

“Fighting area control is assessed by determining who is dictating the pace, place and position of the match.” Fighting Area Control shall only to be assessed if Effective Striking/Grappling and Effective Aggressiveness is 100% equal for both competitors. This will be assessed very rarely.

ROUND SCORING:

10–10 Round

“A 10 – 10 round in MMA is when both fighters have competed for whatever duration of time in the round and there is no difference or advantage between either fighter.” A 10 – 10 round in MMA should be extremely rare and is not a score to be used as an excuse by a judge that cannot assess the differences in the round. A 10 – 10 round in MMA is a necessity to have for the judge’s possible score, mainly due to scoring incomplete rounds. It is possible to have a round where both fighters engage for 5 minutes and at the end of the 5-minute time period the output, impact, effectiveness and overall competition between the two fighters is exactly the same. It is possible, but highly unlikely. If there is any discernable difference between the two fighters during the round the judge shall not give the score of 10 – 10. Again, this score will be extremely rare.

10–9 Round

“A 10 – 9 Round in MMA is where one combatant wins the round by a close margin.” A 10 – 9 round in MMA is the most common score a judge assesses during the night. If, during the round, the judge sees a fighter land the better strikes, or utilize effective grappling during the competition, even if by just one technique over their opponent, the judge shall give the winning fighter a score of 10 while assessing the losing fighter a score of 9 or less. It is imperative that judges understand that a score of 9 is not an automatic numerical score given to the losing fighter of the round. The judge must consider: Was the fighter engaged in offensive actions during the round? Did the losing fighter compete with an attitude of attempting to win the fight, or just to survive the offensive actions of their opponent? A score of 10 – 9 can reflect an extremely close round or a round of marginal domination and/or impact.

10–8 Round

A 10 – 8 Round in MMA is where one fighter wins the round by a large margin. A 10 – 8 round in MMA is not the most common score a judge will render, but it is absolutely essential to the evolution of the sport and the fairness to the fighters that judges understand and effectively utilize the score of 10 – 8. A score of 10 – 8 does not require a fighter to dominate their opponent for 5 minutes of a round. The score of 10 – 8 is utilized by the judge when the judge sees verifiable actions on the part of either fighter. Judges shall ALWAYS give a score of 10 – 8

when the judge has established that one fighter has dominated the action of the round, had duration of the domination and also impacted their opponent with either effective strikes or effective grappling maneuvers that have diminished the abilities of their opponent. Judges must CONSIDER giving the score of 10 – 8 when a fighter shows dominance in the round even though no impactful scoring against the opponent was achieved. MMA is an offensive based sport. No scoring is given for defensive maneuvers. Using smart, tactically sound defensive maneuvers allows the fighter to stay in the fight and to be competitive. Dominance of a round can be seen in striking when the losing fighter continually attempts to defend, with no counters or reaction taken when openings present themselves. Dominance in the grappling phase can be seen by fighters taking DOMINANT POSITIONS in the fight and utilizing those positions to attempt fight ending submissions or attacks. If a fighter has little to no offensive output during a 5 minute round, it should be normal for the judge to consider awarding the losing fighter 8 points instead of 9. Judges must CONSIDER giving the score of 10 – 8 when a fighter IMPACTS their opponent significantly in a round even though they do not dominate the action. Effectiveness in striking or grappling which leads to a diminishing of a fighter's energy, confidence, abilities and spirit. All of these come as a direct result of negative impact. When a fighter is hurt with strikes, showing a lack of control or ability, these can be defining moments in the fight. If a judge sees that a fighter has been significantly damaged in the round the judge should CONSIDER the score of 10 – 8.

Impact –

A judge shall assess if a fighter impacts their opponent significantly in the round, even though they may not have dominated the action. Impact includes visible evidence such as swelling and lacerations. Impact shall also be assessed when a fighter's actions, using striking and/or grappling, lead to a diminishing of their opponents' energy, confidence, abilities and spirit. All of these come as a direct result of impact. When a fighter is impacted with strikes, by lack of control and/or ability, this can create defining moments in the round and shall be assessed with great value.

Dominance –

As MMA is an offensive based sport, dominance of a round can be seen in striking when the losing fighter is forced to continually defend, with no counters or reaction taken when openings present themselves. Dominance in the grappling phase can be seen by fighters taking dominant positions in the fight and utilizing those positions to attempt fight ending submissions or attacks. Merely holding a dominant position(s) shall not be a primary factor in assessing dominance. What the fighter does with those positions is what must be assessed.

Duration –

Duration is defined by the time spent by one fighter effectively attacking, controlling and impacting their opponent; while the opponent offers little to no offensive output. A judge shall assess duration by recognizing the relative time in a round when one fighter takes and maintains full control of the effective offense. This can be assessed both standing and grounded.

10–7 Round

“A 10 – 7 Round in MMA is when a fighter completely overwhelms their opponent in Effective Striking and/or Grappling and stoppage is warranted.” A 10 – 7 round in MMA is a score that

judges will rarely give. It takes both overwhelming DOMINANCE of a round, but also significant IMPACT that, at times, cause the judge to consider that the fight could be stopped. Judges shall look for multiple IMPACTFUL blows or knockdowns that diminish the fighter, and/or grappling maneuvers that place the fighter in dominant situations with impact being inflicted that visibly diminishes the fighter's ability to compete.

Fouls (with explanations where warranted):

**** as of 2017 Unified Rules ****

1. Butting with the head: The head may not be used as a striking instrument in any fashion. Any use of the head as a striking instrument whether head to head, head to body or otherwise is illegal.
2. Eye gouging of any kind: Eye gouging by means of fingers, chin, or elbow is illegal. Legal strikes or punches that contact the fighter's eye socket are not eye gouging and shall be considered legal attacks.
3. Biting or spitting at an opponent: Biting in any form is illegal. A fighter must recognize that a referee may not be able to physically observe some actions, and must make the referee aware if they are being bit during an exhibition of unarmed combat.
4. Fish Hooking: Any attempt by a fighter to use their fingers in a manner that attacks their opponent's mouth, nose or ears, stretching the skin to that area will be considered "Fish hooking". Fish hooking generally is the placing of fingers into the mouth of your opponent and pulling your hands in opposing directions while holding onto the skin of your opponent.
5. Hair pulling: Pulling of the hair in any fashion is an illegal action. A fighter may not grab a hold of his opponent's hair to control their opponent in any way. If a fighter has long hair, they may not use their hair as a tool for holding or choking in any fashion
6. Spiking the opponent to the canvas onto the head or neck (pile-driving): A pile driver is considered to be any throw where you control your opponent's body placing his feet towards the sky with his head straight down and then forcibly drive your opponents head into the canvas or flooring material. It should be noted when a fighter is placed into a submission hold by their opponent, if that fighter is capable of elevating their opponent they may bring that opponent down in any fashion they desire because they are not in control of their opponent's body. The fighter who is attempting the submission can either adjust their position, or let go of their hold before being slammed to the canvas.
7. Strikes to the spine or the back of the head. The spine includes the tailbone. The back of the head is defined as the area starting at the crown of the head and running directly down the centerline of the head with a one inch variance to each side. The entire rear portion of the neck is also illegal to attack starting at the occipital junction and stopping at the top of the trapezius. From the trapezius muscle down the spine is protected to the tailbone
8. Throat strikes of any kind and/or grabbing the trachea: No directed throat strikes are allowed. A directed attack would include a fighter pulling his opponents head in a way to open the neck area for a striking attack. A fighter may not gouge their fingers or thumb into their opponent's

neck or trachea in an attempt to submit their opponent. If during stand up action of a fight a punch is thrown and the punch lands in the throat area of the fighter, this shall be viewed as a clean and legal blow.

9. ** Fingers outstretched toward an opponent's face/eyes: In the standing position, a fighter that moves their arm(s) toward their opponent with an open hand, fingers pointing at the opponent's face/eyes, will be a foul. Referees are to prevent this dangerous behavior by communicating clearly to fighters. Fighters are directed to close their fists or point their fingers straight up in the air when reaching toward their opponent.

10. Downward pointing elbow strike (12 to 6): The use of a linear "straight up straight down" elbow strike is prohibited. Any variation of this straight up and down linear elbow strike makes the strike legal. Any arc, or any angle change from straight up to straight down makes the strike legal. Any variation of position does not alter the legality of the strike.

11. Groin attacks of any kind: Any attack to the groin area including, striking, grabbing, pinching or twisting is illegal. It should be clear that groin attacks are the same for men and women.

12. *Kneeing and/or Kicking the head of a grounded opponent: A grounded fighter is defined as: Any part of the body, other than a single hand and soles of the feet touching the fighting area floor. To be grounded, both hands palm/fist down, and/or any other body part must be touching the fighting area floor. A single knee, arm, makes the fighter grounded without having to have any other body part in touch with the fighting area floor. At this time, kicks or knees to the head will not be allowed

13. *Stomping of a grounded fighter: Stomping is considered any type of striking action with the feet where the fighter lifts their leg up bending their leg at the knee and initiating a striking action with the bottom of their foot or heel. (Note) Axe kicks are not stomps. Standing foot stops are NOT a foul. As such, this foul does not include stomping the feet of a standing fighter. ** A grounded fighter is defined as: Any part of the body, other than a single hand and soles of the feet touching the fighting area floor. To be grounded, both hands palm/fist down, and/or any other body part must be touching the fighting area floor. It needs to be clear to all fighters that once an opponent has become grounded, Stomps of any kind are not permitted, even to the feet.

14. Holding opponent's gloves or shorts: A fighter may not control their opponent's movement by holding onto their opponent's shorts or gloves. A fighter may hold onto or grab their opponent's hand as long as they are not controlling the hand only by using the material of the glove, but by actually gripping the hand of the opponent. It is legal to hold onto your own gloves or shorts

15. Holding or grabbing the fence or ropes with fingers or toes: A fighter may put their hands or feet on the fence and push off of it at anytime. A fighter may place their hands or feet onto the cage and have their fingers or toes go through the fencing material at any time. When a fighter's fingers or toes go through the cage and grab hold of the fence and start to control either their body position or their opponent's body position it now becomes an ILLEGAL action. A fighter may not grab the ropes or wrap their arms over or under the ring ropes at any time. The fighter may not purposely step through the ropes. If a fighter is caught holding the fence, cage or ring rope material the referee shall issue a one-point deduction from the offending fighters scorecard if the foul caused a substantial effect in the fight. If a fighter grabs hold of the cage and because of the infraction, the fouling fighter ends up in a superior position due to the foul, the fighters

should be re-started by the referee, standing in a neutral position after determining if a point deduction is appropriate

16. Small joint manipulation: Fighters must grab the majority of fingers or toes for use as defense or manipulation. Fingers and toes are small joints. Wrists, ankles, knees, shoulders and elbows are all large joints.

17. Throwing an opponent out of the ring or caged area: A fighter shall not throw their opponent out of the ring or cage.

18. Intentionally placing a finger into any orifice, or into any cut or laceration of your opponent: A fighter may not place their fingers into an open laceration in an attempt to enlarge the cut. A fighter may not place their fingers into an opponent's, nose, ears, mouth, or any body cavity

19. Clawing, pinching, twisting the flesh: Any attack that targets the fighter's skin by clawing at the skin or attempting to pull or twist the skin to apply pain is illegal.

20. Timidity (avoiding contact, or consistently dropping the mouthpiece, or faking an injury: Timidity is defined as any fighter who purposely avoids contact with his opponent, or runs away from the action of the fight. Timidity can also be called by the referee for any attempt by a fighter to receive time by falsely claiming a foul, injury, or purposely dropping or spitting out their mouthpiece or other action designed to stall or delay the action of the fight

21. Use of abusive language in the fighting area. The use of abusive language is not allowed during MMA competition. It is the sole responsibility of the referee to determine when language crosses over the line to abusive. It should be clear that fighters can talk during a match. The mere use of auditory language is not a violation of this rule. Examples of abusive language would be (Racially motivated or Derogatory language)

22. Flagrant disregard of the referee's instructions: A fighter MUST follow the instructions of the referee at all times. Any deviation or noncompliance may result in points being deducted from the fighter's scorecard, or the fighter being disqualified from the match.

23. Unsportsmanlike conduct that causes an injury to opponent. Every athlete competing in the sport of MMA is expected to represent the sport in a positive light emphasizing sportsmanship and humility. Any athlete that disrespects the rules of the sport or attempts to inflict unnecessary harm on a competitor who has been either taken out of the competition by the referee or has tapped out of the competition shall be viewed as being unsportsmanlike.

24. Attacking an opponent after the bell has sounded the end of the period of unarmed combat. The end of a round is signified by the sound of the bell and the call of time by the referee. Once the referee has made the call of time, any offensive actions initiated by the fighter shall be considered after the bell and illegal

25. Attacking an opponent on or during the break: A fighter shall not engage their opponent in any fashion during a time-out or break of action in competition

26. Attacking an opponent who is under the care of the referee. Once the referee has called for a stop of the action to protect a fighter who has been incapacitated or is unable to continue to compete in the fight, fighters shall cease all offensive actions against their opponent.

27. Interference from a mixed martial artist's corner or seconds: Interference is defined as any action or activity aimed at disrupting the fight or causing an unfair advantage to be given to one combatant. Corners are not allowed to distract the referee or influence the actions of the referee in any fashion.

REMOVED AS A FOUL- Throwing in the towel during competition

A fighter's corner, at the Commission's discretion, should have the option to retire his fighter in the quickest and most efficient manner possible, during competition. A corner person having worked alongside a fighter may recognize and accept what their fighter's capabilities are from past experience. It makes sense from a safety perspective to allow a corner to retire the fighter. If there is consideration that debris in the form of a towel entering the ring or cage may contribute to a disruption or confusion in the contest, then colored towels or special towels might be a consideration to be used.

Scoring the foul to be performed by the Scorekeeper

Fouls may result in a point being deducted by the official scorekeeper from the offending mixed martial artist's score. The scorekeeper, not the judges, will be responsible for calculating the true score after factoring in the point deduction.

Only a referee can assess a foul. If the referee does not call the foul, judges shall not make that assessment on their own and cannot factor such into their scoring calculations.

Foul Procedures

If a foul is committed, the referee shall:

1. call time;
2. check the fouled mixed martial artist's condition and safety; and
3. assess the foul to the offending contestant, deduct points, and notify each corner's seconds, judges and the official scorekeeper.

If a bottom contestant commits a foul, unless the top contestant is injured, the fight shall continue, so as not to jeopardize the top contestant's superior positioning at the time.

1. The referee shall verbally notify the bottom contestant of the foul.
2. When the round is over, the referee shall assess the foul and notify both corners' seconds, the judges and the official scorekeeper.
3. The referee may terminate a bout based on the severity of a foul. For such a flagrant foul, a contestant shall lose by disqualification.

Time Considerations for Fouls

Low Blow Foul

A fighter who has been struck with a low blow is allowed up to five minutes to recover from the foul as long as in the ringside doctor's opinion the fighter may possibly continue on in the contest. If the fighter states that they can continue on before the five minutes of time have expired, the referee shall as soon as practical restart the fight. If the fighter goes over the five minute time allotment the fight cannot be restarted and the contest must come to an end with the outcome determined by the round and time in which the fight was stopped.

Fighter who is not fouled by low blow but another foul

If a contest or exhibition of mixed martial arts is stopped because of an accidental foul, the referee shall determine whether the unarmed combatant who has been fouled can continue or not. If the unarmed combatant's chance of winning has not been seriously jeopardized as a result of the foul and if the foul did not involve a concussive impact to the head of the unarmed combatant who has been fouled, the referee may order the contest or exhibition continued after a recuperative interval of not more than 5 minutes. Immediately after separating the unarmed combatants, the referee shall inform the Commission's representative of his determination that the foul was accidental.

If a fighter is fouled by blow that the referee deems illegal, the referee should stop the action and call for time. The referee may take the injured fighter to the ringside doctor and have the ringside doctor examine the fighter as to their ability to continue on in the contest. The ringside doctor has up to 5 minutes to make their determination. If the ringside doctor determines that the fighter can continue in the contest, the referee shall as soon as practical restart the fight. However, unlike the low blow foul rule, the fighter does not have up to 5 minutes of time to use at their discretion.

For a foul other than a low blow, the fouled fighter is not guaranteed 5 minutes of recovery time. If deemed not fit to continue by the referee or ringside physician, the referee must immediately call a halt to the bout. If the fighter is deemed not fit to continue by the referee or ringside physician but some of the five minute foul time is still remaining, the fighter cannot avail himself of the remaining time.

If the referee stops the contest and employs the use of the ringside doctor, the ringside physician's examinations shall not exceed five minutes. If five minutes is exceeded, the fight cannot be re-started and the contest must end.

Scoring of incomplete rounds

There should be scoring of an incomplete round. If the referee penalizes either contestant, then the appropriate points shall be deducted when the scorekeeper calculates the final score for the partial round.

Verbal tap out

1.Submission by Tap Out:

When a contestant physically uses his hand to indicate that he or she no longer wishes to continue; or

ii. Verbal tap out: When a contestant verbally announces to the referee that he or she does not wish to continue or makes audible sounds such as screams indicating pain or discomfort

COMBAT AREA (Ring / Cage)

All MMA contests will take place in either a Cage or a Ring that has been approved by the Commission. The Cage or Ring will meet the requirements set forth by each Commission and also be subject to inspection prior to each event by a Commission representative such as a referee.

Rings

The ring specifications for mixed martial arts must meet the following requirements:(1) The ring may be no smaller than twenty feet square and no larger than thirty-two feet square within the ropes;(2) One of the corners must have a blue designation, the corner directly across must have a red designation;(3) The ring floor must extend at least eighteen inches beyond the ropes. The ring floor must be padded with ensolite or a similar closed-cell foam, with at least one inch layer of foam padding. Padding must extend beyond the ring ropes and over the edge platform, with a top covering of canvas, duck or similar material tightly stretched and laced to the ring platform. Material that tends to gather in lumps and ridges may not be used;(4) The ring platform must not be more than four feet above the floor of the building and must have suitable steps for the use of the contestants;(5) Ring posts must be made of metal, not more than three inches in diameter, extending from the floor of the building to a minimum height of fifty-eight inches above the ring floor, and must be properly padded in a manner approved by the commission. Ring posts must be eighteen inches away from the ring ropes;(6) There must be five ring ropes, not less than one inch in diameter and wrapped in soft material. The lowest rope must be no higher than twelve inches from the ring floor;(7) There must not be any obstruction or object, on any part of the ring floor.

Cages

The fighting area canvas shall be no smaller than 18 feet by 18 feet and no larger than 32 feet by 32 feet. The fighting area canvas shall be padded in a manner as approved by the Commission, with at least one inch layer of foam padding.

Padding shall extend beyond the fighting area and over the edge of the platform. No vinyl or other plastic rubberized covering shall be permitted.

The fighting area canvas shall not be more than four feet above the floor of the building and shall have suitable steps or ramp for use by the participants. Posts shall be made of metal not more than six inches in diameter, extending from the floor of the building to a minimum height of 58 inches above the fighting area canvas and shall be properly padded in a manner approved by the Commission. The fighting area canvas area shall be enclosed by a fence made of such material as will not allow a fighter to fall out or break through it onto the floor or spectators, including, but not limited to, vinyl coated chain link fencing. All metal parts shall be covered and padded in a manner approved by the Commission and shall not be abrasive to the contestants. The fence shall provide two separate entries onto the fighting area canvas.

RULE MEETINGS (General Guidelines)

In many jurisdictions, group rule meetings have been commonplace in the reviewing of rules, fouls and other considerations. It is recommended that individual meetings between the bout supervising referee and each competitor in the contest be conducted backstage in the locker room or another appropriate location. Many times contestants will ask questions of the official when the rules are covered individually in private, when they would have been hesitant to ask the same question in front of their competitor. This also provides the referee to observe any peculiar idiosyncrasies of the fighter, such as an odd speech pattern, nervous ticks, or different eye colors. This does not supersede the ability of the Commission to have a general rules meeting about the requirements and also discuss items such as a fighter's time to report, the location, interaction with the inspectors, available liquids and foods, taping requirements and so on, with all the fighters gathered en masse.

Weight Classes

The generally accepted weight classes in mixed martial arts are:

Flyweight up to 125 lbs.

Bantamweight over 125 to 135 lbs

Featherweight over 135 to 145 lbs

Lightweight over 145 to 155 lbs

Welterweight over 155 to 170 lbs

Middleweight over 170 to 185 lbs

Light Heavyweight over 185 to 205 lbs

Heavyweight over 205 to 265 lbs

Super Heavyweight over 265 lbs.

It is recommended that the unwritten custom of the one pound allowance for non-title bouts be continued, but only if provided for in the written bout contract or by regulation.

Commissions may also approve catch weight bouts, subject to their review and discretion. For example, the Commission may still decide to allow the contest if it feels that the contest would still be fair, safe and competitive if a set catch weight is set in advance at 163 pounds, for example.

In addition, if one athlete weighs in at 264 pounds while the opponent weighs in at 267, the Commission may still decide to allow the contest if it feels that the contest would still be fair and competitive. This would be despite the fact that the two athletes weighed in at differing weight classes.

Commissions should establish and make known to promoters the maximum allowable weight differences for contestants for each weight class.

Handwraps

All mixed martial arts contestants shall be required to gauze and tape their hands prior to all contests. In all weight classes, the bandages on each contestant's hand shall be restricted to soft gauze cloth not more than 10 yards in length and two inches in width, held in place by not more than 10 feet of surgeon's tape, one inch in width, for each hand. Surgeon's adhesive tape shall be placed directly on each hand for protection near the wrist. However, as opposed to boxing wraps, the tape may cross the back of the hand twice and extend to cover and protect the knuckles when the hand is clenched to make a fist. The bandages shall be evenly distributed across the hand. Bandages and tape shall be placed on the contestant's hands in the dressing room in the presence of the inspector and, if warranted, in the presence of the manager or chief second of his or her opponent.

Under no circumstances are gloves to be placed on the hands of a contestant until the approval of the inspector is received. Substances other than tape and gauze shall not be utilized. For example, prewraps should not be used.

Females

Females competitors should be allowed to compete in five minute rounds, three rounds for non-title bouts and five rounds for title bouts.

Gloves

All contestants shall wear glove which are at least 4 ounces and are approved by the Commission. The language should not place a limit on 6 ounce gloves. The discussion by the group was prompted by the introduction of triple XL or five XL gloves which, due to the additional material, may weigh over 6 ounces.

Gloves should be supplied by the promoter and approved by the commission. No contestant shall supply their own gloves for participation.

Use of Vaseline and other similar substances

Absolutely "no" body grease, gels, balms, lotions oils, or other substances may be applied to the hair, face or body. This includes the use of excessive amounts of water "dumped" on a contestant to make him/her slippery. However, Vaseline may be applied solely to the facial area at cage side or ringside in the presence of an inspector, referee, or a person designated by the commission. Any contestant applying anything other than Vaseline in an approved fashion at the appropriate time could be penalized a point or subject to loss by disqualification.

Double Knockout Situations

The referee shall stop a contest or exhibition of unarmed combat at any stage if the referee determines that both unarmed combatants are in such a condition that to continue might subject the unarmed combatants to serious injury. If a contest or exhibition is stopped pursuant to this subsection, the decision shall be deemed to be a technical draw.

Fighter Appearance

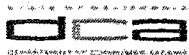
It is recommended that a Commission inspector or referee bring a clipper and a file to each event and check the fingernail length of all contestants.
